Norway was a spectacular destination for us filled with memorable hiking and cycling opportunites, a unique history and culture, lovely people and LOTS of adventure!

Our summer solstice timing was perfect for experiencing the unique lighting and days where the sun never set while we were in the Arctic Circle, but it was also still early enough in the summer season for the continued spring melting of snow to make for great waterfall viewing along the fjords and also inland.

The weather was mild and sunny all or part of every day, including far up into the Arctic Circle ~ in fact, we awoke to nearly 60* F temps in the northernmost "cities" on the European continent (Honningsvag and Hammerfest ~ which are very nearly the northernmost cities in the world).

More superlatives: Wealthy Norway is widely considered to be the most expensive country in Europe and, also by many, the most expensive country in the world. A good thing to know when planning your travels there!

~Flam~


Flam is located on a finger of the Sognefjord (the longest fjord in Norway at 128 miles long and at a maximum depth of 4,291 feet) We spent the first part of our day there enjoying the scenery and countless waterfalls from the famous Flamsbana train. The Flam Railway (which opened in the 1940's) connects Flam and the Sognefjord to the Bergen-Oslo railway to the south.

The Flamsbana train will take you 2,835 feet in elvation in only 12 miles on what remains the steepest railway of its kind in the world (adhesion-type railway on normal tracks). Most of the 20 tunnels were excavated by hand, mile by mile. There is a fascinating museum in Flam about this railway and its incredible engineering.

After our training adventure in the early morning, we spent our entire afternoon hiking to Brekkefossen waterfall, ending what was a beautiful first full day within the fjords of Norway.






















